2.6 Innovative processes adopted by the institution in Teaching and Learning:

The faculty members adopts enhanced teaching methodology for effective delivery of course content through

- NPTEL Video Lectures
- Computer aided teaching and learning materials has been prepared using ICT infrastructure.
- Conduct of Assignments, tutorials, Class room tests and Group discussions on Case studies.
- Conduct of Carrier Guidance and counseling activities as a part of regular timetable which help students to acquire potentials to mould them according to their future goals and ambitions.
- Research articles from journals

- To acquire additional knowledge, add on courses like C Programming,
 Spoken English, etc has been conducted.
- Establishing MoUS with industry and academia so as to conduct certification programmes like CCNA, Oracle, Cisco etc which helps the students to bridge the gap between the industry requirements and the concepts they obtained as a part of the core curriculum.
- To impart social responsibility in students NCC /NSS activities are conducted regularly.
- IT enabled education system
- Quiz / Online hunt
- Reverse Engineering
- Brown Bag
- Conduct Student Seminars
- Slide Presentations (through LCD / OHP), Audio-Visual Aids, Lecture Videos, Simulations, Charts

Apart from these classroom activities, students are also encouraged to visit R&D centres that are equipped with state-of-the-art high end equipments which enables the learners to acquire a practical knowledge, based on their curriculum aspects.

Extended classroom learning and innovative teaching methods like

- Field trips
- Industrial visits
- In-service training
- Working at the Industrial units provides an experience of actual working environment.

Few other conductive methods are adopted by the staff members in inducing higher order thinking skills among students by prompting them with question-answer session at the end of lecture hour.

Remedial classes are conducted for week students and slow learners outside the regular class hours or during the preparatory holidays. Weak students are also encouraged to meet the teachers in the department and to get counselling for their improvement.

The innovative methods help the students:

- In the practical application of subject knowledge
- Towards creating innovative ideas on the subject
- In depth analysis of the theoretical framework

2.8 Examination/ Evaluation Reforms initiated by the Institution

- Conduct of examinations during April/May for even semester and Nov/Dec for odd semester
- Tentative dates of examination dates are made available in the University Calendar.
- University examination dates are announced atleast a minimum of 50 days in advance.
- Question papers for all the courses (UG, PG and PhD) are obtained from external experts. Information about the question paper setters are kept confidential.
- Central Valuation System by external experts for all UG and PG courses.
- Provision for revaluation system.
- An Internal Examination Cell has been formed for conducting Internal Assessment Examinations. Every Semester CAE1 and CAE2 is conducted by the Internal Examination Cell.
- A novel model of answer booklet with digital number format.
- Provision of dummy numbers in the answer scripts.
- The Internal marks are announced to the students well in advance before the commencement of the end semester examination.
- Software is exclusively maintained by the Controller of Examination Office for handling all types of exam related process (like maintaining student information, subject and regulation details, university results, issue of transcripts, provisional certificates, degree certificates etc.,).
- For PhD, evaluation of thesis is done by Indian and Foreign Examiner.
- Examination results are declared within 15 days of the commencement of succeeding semester. University results are updated in the website immediately so that student as well as parent can get the result without any further delay. SMS and letters are also sent to the parents after the declaration of revaluation results.
- University has embarked on a pilot project to conduct this year's exam for students using iPad and stylus.
