Apart from these classroom activities, students are also encouraged to visit R&D centers that are equipped with state-of-the-art high end equipments which enables the learners to acquire a practical knowledge, based on their curriculum aspects.

- Working at the Industrial units provides an experience of actual working environment.

Few other conducive methods are adopted by the staff members in inducing higher order thinking skills among students by prompting them with question-answer session at the end of lecture hour.

Remedial classes are conducted for week students and slow learners outside the regular class hours or during the preparatory holidays. Weak students are also encouraged to meet the teachers in the department and to get counseling for their improvement.

3.25 Major Activities during the year in the sphere of extension activities and Institutional Social Responsibility

The University as a part of its regular academic curricular activities insists a sense of institutional social responsibility to its faculty and students. The outcome of such sensitization has resulted in several outreach programs and activities. A few are highlighted below:

Various training programmes have been organized for the corporate from different industries every year on several aspects of science and technology. Conceptual and practical sessions are handled by our expert faculty. The programs are framed on the current trends of the user community. The university has conducted around 25 such programmes in the recent past.

Awareness Camps were conducted in the adopted villages wherein Women day, Voter Id card, wealth out of waste, tree plantation were held through Student Development Cell (SDC) and Community Development Cell (CDC) of Sathyabama University. Mass Rapid Transit System (MRTS) was adorned with wall painting by the University students as part of beautifying Thiruvanmiyur station, Chennai.

Engineers from nuclear industries are trained by Centre for NDE to understand the basic principles of various NDT methods, discontinuities in different product forms, importance of NDT, applications, limitations of NDT methods and techniques and codes, standards and specifications related to non-destructive testing technology. NDT conducts certification programs for welders.

Workshops and training programmes are conducted for scientists using specialized softwares. The objective of such programmes is to train the participants in planning and implementation of information systems projects.

Remote Sensing Centre invites school students from the rural areas of Kanchipuram district for creating awareness on remote sensing and GIS.

Through this programme the basic principles of electromagnetic spectrum and intriguing basic principles of physics including satellite technology are taught to the students. As a part of ISR the centre has created community awareness on protection of natural resources by optimizing the technological approaches that would ensure sustainable development. Such programmes are conducted throughout the year for the benefit of the society.

Our University has organized several workshops for the self help group, unemployed women on computer literacy like Tally, MS office to enable them to equip them with basic e-knowledge.

Programs are organized on mushroom cultivation, handicrafts, food processing and on cottage industry products to empower women to become micro entrepreneurs. Also awareness is created on government schemes for acquiring soft loans, avenues available for small businesses, time management and financial literacy.

The University houses a Technology Business Incubator through which it serves the nearby rural community by providing skill development and promoting employment opportunities.

The TBI provides infrastructure and financial support to unemployed youth who have innovative ideas this enables them to incubate their idea and become independent entrepreneurs.

The University provides services to the marginalized and down trodden community of the nearby coastal villages. Fisherwomen from the coastal areas are trained in seaweed cultivation for alternative livelihood. Thus the above are some of the outreach programmes that our University has integrated with academic curriculum.

INTERNATIONAL YOGA DAY:

The United Nations has declared 21 Jun as the International Day of Yoga. As per the Honorable Prime Minister's directions, NCC cadets across the country have to participate in this event and set a world record (Guinness & Limca). As directed, Sathyabama University NCC Air Wing organized the Yoga Day program for Air cadets, 50 cadets participated and benefited.

Overseas students

Overseas Students receive guidance and counseling, besides travel assistance.

Physically challenged / differently-abled students

Differently abled Students are exempted in payment of fees towards their transport and food and buildings are designed with ramps for their movements inside the university.

SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections

University is catering to the needs of students belonging to deprived communities of Scheduled castes, Scheduled tribes, other backward classes and low-income groups. SC and ST Students are encouraged to continue their education by way of Scholarships from Government and Non – Government Organizations.

<u>Students participating in various competitions/conferences in India</u> and abroad

Several Welfare Schemes like sponsorship for Students Projects, sponsorship for International and National Conferences at home and abroad, works shops, Meets, Symposiums etc are always given to the students. Apart from these the University also provides needy students with study and sports material, payment of examination, tuition fees and organizes medical aid to students scholarship for sports students, scholarship for meritorious students and financial assistance for in house projects.

Health centre, health insurance etc.

The university has state of art gymnasium for girls and boys separately which can be utilized for free of cost. Yoga classes are conducted regularly. In house medical facility is available for 24 hours inside the University campus. All the students of the university are covered under accidental insurance for a maximum of rupees one lakh.

Skill development (spoken English, computer literacy, etc.)

Coaching in Computer Language and Spoken English classes are being conducted from 3pm to 8pm in Hostels for boys and girls. Internet facilities are offered to students from 3.00pm onwards at free of cost .Advanced Computer language classes are offered at CISCO sponsored lab.

Performance enhancement for slow learners

- Diagnosis Test was conducted to find out the weaker students and train them based on their need.
- > Special classes for average and weak students are conducted regularly.
- Extra assignments and hand out materials are given to support them in their academics.
- > Training programs are conducted periodically to enhance their vocabulary (idioms, phrases etc) and language usage to meet the situation were some of the aspects.

Exposure of students to other institutions of higher learning/corporate/business houses, etc.

- Students are exposed to industrial visits, workshops, training programs, seminars, paper presentations, and conferences, exhibitions, organized by various technical institutions within and outside the state.
- ➤ **Cognizant** accredited as their academic partner and they are involved with us in various Skill Developments Program. Few of the programs are: Evolve, Faculty Enrichment Programs and experience Cognizant.

- ➤ **Wipro** certified Sathyabama University as "TRUSTED ACADEMIC PARTNER". Few of the programs sponsored by Wipro are "Mission 10X", "Jump Start".
- Accenture signed an MOU with us and become a consistent recruiter at Sathyabama. They are conducting "Mind Power Enhancement Program" and "Soft skill development Programs" for our students. "Accenture career Day" is being conducted every day to give an insight on Accenture's offer to the students.
- ➤ **Infosys** training our students through their "Campus Connect" Initiative. Faculty enrichment programs also conducted by Infosys.
- VirtuSA had setup two labs (Mobile Application Development Lab & Rich Internet Access lab) at Sathyabama. Students from CSE, IT and MCA being taught and trained on Mobile Application Development by Virtusa Technical Experts.
- **Computer Science Corporation** selected 30 of our students and assigned themprojects which is being mentored by CSC managers.
- Sathyabama signed MOU with **FLSmith** which helps our students to get Industrial exposure through industrial visits and knowledge sharing.
- EmersonAutomation had sponsored a machine (UniDrive SP Model) which is being used by Electrical students as part of their regular curriculum and for research activities

Publication of student magazines

Every department publish their department magazines consisting of student activities, achievements in sports, cultural, academics and community services.

5.2 Efforts made by the institution for tracking the progression

Yes. The University always has a keen eye towards the student support and mentoring as it assists them in providing Faculty as counsellor for the Students throughout their stay in their university. All the student counsellors are involved in both academic and personal counseling for a group of 20 students for whom they were allocated.

The Counsellor maintains a complete record of the student activity in the campus. They also work hand-in-hand with the parent by bringing them up to date on their ward's progression like sending assessment marks and daily attendance through SMS. The counsellors and staff provide guidance to students to enhance their quality of education, encourage them to participate in sports and cultural activities. The faculties working as hostel warden provide round the clock assistance to the students in personal needs and in academics. The hostel students and day scholars can meet the counsellor for Special Counseling if required. Expert members are invited to provide counseling in academics and the best practices for well being of the students periodically. A Separate Counsellor for Women is available in the campus. The faculty also provide counseling to the students in academic and personal areas, and two staff members for each class are deputed for this purpose.

5.4 Details of student support mechanism for coaching for competitive examinations (If any)

ADVISORY BUREAU FOR HIGHER STUDIES

Bureau for Higher Studies was started to guide those students who are aspiring for Higher Education and enable students to prepare for examination like the GATE, GRE, GMATE, TOEFL and civil services examination like IAS, IPS and IFS.

JAPANESE language classes – "First Level" are conducted for First year CSE and IT students. A total of 70 students attended in two batches. This helps them in their admissions at various foreign universities.

Quantitative Aptitude & Analytical Reasoning Training classes are conducted regularly for U.G and P.G. students at our University Campus. This course is intended to train students for performing well in Campus Interviews. This course is being handled by our own Maths faculty.

Personality Development Workshops are also conducted throughout the year for final year, and pre-final year students with eminent resource persons to train our students in various areas like Group Discussions, attending Interviews, Communication Skills, Interpersonal Skills, etc. The above training helped around 75% of students in getting suitable placements in various top notch companies.
